6-7 Remember: A stingy planter gets a stingy crop; a lavish planter gets a lavish crop. I want each of you to take plenty of time to think it over, and make up your own mind what you will give. That will protect you against sob stories and armtwisting. God loves it when the giver delights in the giving.

Not only does our Heavenly Father expect his children to give lavishly, but he expects us to do so by definite decision so manipulation is not involved in the process. You see, when we obediently give extravagantly and with a definite decision, we are showing that we, his chilBy Mrs. Sojourner

Love, what a word! Today in our society love has come to have so many meanings it can be difficult to know just what the

word actually does mean. Often when a word meets this fate we must resort to the context in which it is used to "fine tune" the meaning to our personal understanding. This method of defining a word can even go astray if we put our own hopes, desires, and aspirations into the meaning that were not intended by the person who said the word love. Someone may say, "I love you." but that can be misinterpreted when the hearer puts into the statement a meaning not intended.

When I was studying in the university I learned the more important a word was to a people the more words, more specific words, a language had in it for a particular topic to prevent misunderstanding and to protect both the speaker and the hearer. I was told, for example, Eskimos had over 30 words for snow

so as to be very specific as to what kind of snow was coming. An accurate meaning for the word snow to an Eskimo could mean life or

death. The word snow was, therefore, an important word.

Love Today

The word love, can be very easily misunderstood. Actually a person could determine that in the English language the word love was not very important since the one word covers so many different emotions and even opinions! "I love that color," "I just love that jacket," "I loved the movie," or "I just love them," for example.

It is a little challenging to grasp what the word love means exactly when it is used for so many different expressions.

Love, Grace, And God

Given these uses of the word love it is easy to see how hearing someone say, "God is love," or "God loves you,"



The Greatest Love

The greatest love connection is that of God to mankind via Jesus the Christ! Our scripture brings this out so clearly. When the Apostle John recorded the words of Jesus in Chapter 15 of his Gospel, Jesus made it very clear the importance of the word love when it comes to God and God's Kingdom!

The command Jesus spoke of in John 15:12 was the command to love. Love as used by God is the very essence of God.

When Jesus spoke in the next verse (:13) he said, "Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends." When Jesus gave up his life on the cross he was proving the meaning of the word love and what it means to God!

Jesus fulfilled the Law of Moses so we would not have to live our lives striving for a target we could never hit! Godly behavior comes from following Jesus' commandment in John 15:12! Any godly behavior a believer engages in is not to pay a price for their 'missing the mark' or 'falling short,' but is a thank you card, a love offering, to God for the gift of grace given not just the day they accepted Christ but for all the breaths granted them until they pass into eternity with Christ!

Not understanding grace is to not understand the new creature a believer becomes at the moment Christ is accepted. Not understanding the place of grace and the empowerment via the Holy Spirit to share the message of grace, by love, conferred on every believer is indeed sad.

This I know, it is not possible to give away what one does not possess. Perhaps some who are 'Christians' by philosophy, which is salvation by works (not God's plan), rely on behavior and judgment rather than being Christian by relationship which is the salvation given by God (is God's plan). 'Christians' by philosophy have never understood grace and thus are unable to give/show to others the grace (undeserved favor) God, through Christ's love, gives so freely to those who accept him and his great love gift!
